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WHY I ALWAYS PUBLISH IN THE SAME JOURNAL?

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Abstract.-As could not be otherwise, I explain here why since 2021 I always publish my papers in the same scientific journal: The General Science Journal.

Although I detest autobiographies, I consider it necessary to give the readers of my articles a minimal explanation of why, in fact, for the last six years I have always published in the same scientific journal: The General Science Journal. Previously, until 2020, I had done so in six other different journals, which could be described as normal scientific journals. In all those cases, the articles published could also be considered as normal: they did not go against any well-established current of thought in contemporary science. But neither were they the articles I wished to publish and to which I have devoted most of my scientific activity since 1991, first on the inconsistency of the actual infinity, and somewhat later on the consequences of this inconsistency for the foundations of physics. So far it has been impossible for me to publish a single paper on those two issues. Not even in the self-styled progressive journals, let alone in those that already explicitly state that they do not publish papers that criticize well-established currents of thought in contemporary science (there are some!).

The referees' comments justifying the rejection of those dissenting articles were really of a lousy quality; and in some cases shameful (I wrote something about them in [1]). By 2017 I became convinced of the impossibility of publishing my dissenting papers on mathematical infinity and on its consequences on physical theories, particularly on the theory of special relativity. I then made the decision to rewrite those papers in the form of books and self-publish them. In the year 2020 I discovered The General Science Journal, which allows you to publish both peer-reviewed and non-peer-reviewed articles, and also to upload published articles to scientific networks such as Academia.edu and ResearchGate. All this has allowed my papers to have been at least browsed more than 49500 times. I thank you for all of this, and I apologize for my social autism that does not allow me to respond to comments or thank you for the reading and recommendations of some of my papers and books.
